Meet the Coaches

BRIAN YOUNG

Head Coach • Sixth Season • University of New Hampshire '95



Brian Young is entering his sixth year as the head men's soccer coach for the Hilltoppers. In 2006, he led the Hilltoppers through their best season in seven years. In 2007, St. Edward's ended the season in second place, just one-half game out of the top spot in the Heartland Conference. Last season, the Hilltoppers were nationally ranked for almost the entire season, moving up as high as 12th and finished on the cusp of making its first NCAA regional appearance since 1999, with a 13-4-2 record.

Young came to St. Edward's University after spending six years as the assistant men's soccer coach at Brown University in Providence, R.I. He helped the team win four Ivy League Championships (1997, 1998, 2000 and 2001) and make four NCAA Division I tournament appearances (1997, 1998, 1999 and 2000). The 1999 squad advanced to the Sweet 16, while the 2000 squad made the Elite Eight. Young coordinated national and international recruitment of high school student-athletes. He assisted in coaching five All-Americans and 11 players who have been drafted in the annual Major League Soccer Superdraft or have signed MLS contracts (FC Dallas, LA Galaxy, Kansas City Wizards, Columbus Crew and New England Revolution). While he was at Brown, the Bears posted an overall record of 61-35-10 (.576) and an Ivy League record of 28-8-5 (.683).

Prior to Brown, Young spent one year as an assistant coach at Bates College, where he helped the team to the East College Athletic Conference tournament and BBC title. He was co-founder, technical director and head coach of Bruno United Futbol Club from 2002 to 2003. Young was involved with the Lake Travis Soccer Club in Austin. He was the head coach and director of player development for the club, where he led his team (U14) to the 2003 state finals. Young was also the '90 Boy's head coach with the Olympic Development Program for South Texas Youth Soccer.

Young played collegiate soccer at the University of New Hampshire in Durham, N.H. He helped his 1994 team to the first NCAA Division I tournament appearance in UNH history. He earned All-North Atlantic Conference Tournament honors in 1993 and 1994. After graduating from UNH, Young played professionally with the Cape Cod Crusaders Soccer Club in the United States Interregional Soccer League from 1995 to 1997. Young holds a NSCAA Advanced National Diploma and the USSF 'A' license.

ADRIAN RIGBY

Assistant Coach • Fifth Season • Averett University '01



Adrian Rigby is entering his fifth season as the assistant men's soccer coach for St. Edward's. During this time, the team achieved an NSCAA top 25 ranking in the 2006 and 2008 seasons, climbing as high as #12 in the 2008 poll. The Hilltoppers also achieved the NSCAA all-academic team in 2006, 2007 and 2008 maintaining at least a 3.0 GPA. He has also been active for several years in the local and state soccer community, working with local club teams and the South Texas Olympic Development Program.

He came to St. Edward's after serving as the graduate assistant coach/head goalkeeper trainer at Midwestern State University for two seasons. In 2003, the school advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight, and in 2004, Midwestern's goalie was named Southwest Soccer Conference Goalkeeper of the Year. Rigby also served as a trainer and head goalkeeper coach for the Xpress Soccer Club in Wichita Falls, Texas.

He began his coaching career at Dan River High School in Danville, Va., as the women's head coach in 2001. After six months at Dan River, he spent two months as the director of the Summer Soccer Academy at Hargrave Military Academy. He also served as the graduate assistant at Averett University in 2001.

Rigby graduated from Averett University in 2001 with a BS in Sports Medicine/Wellness and completed his MEd in Curriculum Instruction/Kinesiology at Midwestern State University in 2005.

A four-year starter at Averett, he was selected to the 1998 all-state team, and 1998 and 2001 all-conference teams. Rigby also played professionally with the Vancouver 86'ers reserve squad of the A-League in 1999. He holds a USSF 'B' license and NSCAA Goalkeeping Level-1 and Level-2 license.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Rigby also serves as an instructor in the Kinesiology program at St. Edward's.

Season Preview

HILLTOPPERS LOOK TO FINISH STRONG

The St. Edward's men's soccer team has improved its win total and conference placing in each of the last four seasons. This past season, **Brian Young** and his players were nationally ranked as high as 12th and finished strong with a 13-4-2 record. In 2009, the Hilltoppers return eight starters and 11 letterwinners.

"I felt at the end of last season, the team and staff were disappointed with ourselves that we didn't win enough matches to make the NCAA tournament," Young says. "We tied the last two matches under some extreme circumstances and didn't produce a win. However, the team was very motivated in the off-season as we played some tough matches against the 2008 MLS champion Columbus Crew, the USL First-Division I Austin Aztex, and some very high-level junior college teams. At the end of the year, every player was eager to start pre-season and get back to our winning ways. This is very encouraging for this upcoming season."

The Hilltopper attacking front will again be led by seniors **John Calandro** and **Josh Nannen**. The duo combined for eight goals and four assists last season. Nannen, who transferred from the Air Force Academy in 2007, suffered through an injury-marred season but still tallied three goals and two assists. He will be looking to regain the form that produced eight goals and a first-team All-Heartland Conference selection in 2007. Calandro, who missed five of the first eight matches last season, will see the majority of his time at the forward position in 2009. In his three seasons for St. Edward's, he has scored 13 goals and dished out seven assists. Calandro has one of two hat tricks since the 2003 season. Nannen has the other one. Two new players, freshman **Steven Haltom** and fifth-year senior **Scott Strickland**, will also be in the mix at the forward position.

"Both Calandro and Nannen are accomplished goal scorers and have a knack for scoring game-winning goals," Young says. "Both have carried injuries throughout last season. I am looking forward to them playing the entire season. We have also added good depth at the position with Steven Haltom who played in the prestigious Dallas Cup 'Super Group' and Scott Strickland, who was the second-leading scorer for Columbia University in the talent-rich Ivy League last season."

The midfield position is another area where the Hilltoppers have a wealth of talent. They return five players who saw significant minutes on the field last season. Senior **Kevin Klaus** and junior **Jorge Vega** return after picking up post-season honors last season. Both were named to the All-Heartland Conference team while Klaus was honored as all-region and third-team All-America, along with being Heartland Conference Freshman of the Year in 2006. Seniors **Beau Grantier**, **Ezual Lewis** and junior **Trey Perkins** all combined for 47 appearances last season. Lewis and Perkins each had overtime game-winning goals. Junior **Joeski Williams**, sophomore **Sean Arters**, and freshmen **Scott Arters**, **Josh Galante**, **Ian Peoples** and **Shane Randig** will add additional depth.

"We have a lot of good players returning and coming aboard at the midfield position," Young says. "We have improved our athleticism at this position. I am looking forward to see who rises to the top and takes the starting nods. Midfield was very important last season because they scored a lot of goals for us. This season we plan to spread the ball around and get everybody involved once again."

Possibly the most solid group on the field, the defenders, return three starters from last season. Seniors **AJ Prebensen** and **Brandin Parras**, along with sophomore **Terry Stewart** will be back as part of the Hilltoppers back line who contributed greatly to a defense that allowed a 0.71 goals-against average, while producing seven shutouts. Gone from last year's squad is **Dustin Cherry** who picked up honorable mention All-America honors for his play. The Hilltoppers will add three transfers and two freshmen to help strengthen the defense. Freshmen **JR Ellis** and **Keston Smith** will join **Dushane Ashman** (Lon Morris College), **Taylor Hickman** and **Bryan Van Cura** (University of San Francisco).

"Losing Dustin Cherry to graduation is a big loss as he helped lead a backline that allowed only 14 goals on the season, the fewest in the program's history," Young says. "Chemistry is always important when it comes to defense, so the three returnees and newcomers will have to mesh together quickly. Not only will

our defenders be more athletic this season, but they all have the ability to push forward on the attack."

Junior **Matt Moore** returns after having one of the best seasons in goal in school history. He played all but 50 minutes in goal for the Hilltoppers, producing a 13-4-2 record and a 0.73 goals-against average. For his efforts he was named first-team all-region. Sophomore **Mitch McKeefer** returns and joins incoming freshman **John Kaschak**, looking to earn playing time.

"Matt Moore had an outstanding season last year," Young says. "I look forward to him stepping up his leadership on the defensive end. He made some outstanding saves that won us several matches last season. He played through many injuries and his play never suffered. Mitch McKeefer and John Kashack will have their work cut out for them in trying to unseat Moore from the starting spot."

THE SCHEDULE

St. Edward's needed only one win in its final two matches last season to secure its first Heartland Conference title since the 2000 season, but it produced ties against St. Mary's and Texas A&M—International and finished a close second to Incarnate Word. The Hilltoppers will again compete with an Incarnate Word team that seems to reload every year and the up-and-coming Texas A&M—International will be in the mix.

"The Heartland Conference is emerging as one of the better conferences in the country," Young says. "Many of the teams in the conference defeated nationally ranked teams last season which was a surprise to a lot of coaches outside the conference, but not to the coaches within the conference. Each coach in the Heartland has strengthened their 2009 schedule and as I stated last year, every team has the ability to take a win away from any team in the conference this season. I am looking forward to another exciting finish in the conference."

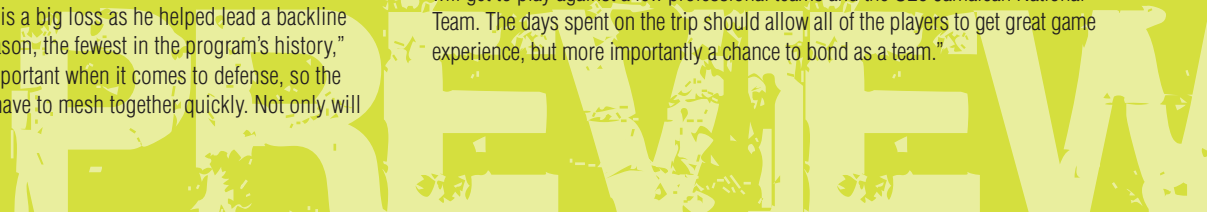
The Hilltoppers will have one of the toughest opening schedules in the nation this season. St. Edward's will face five teams who were nationally ranked last season. The Hilltoppers will host West Texas A&M and Midwestern State, along with Colorado School of Mines and Fort Lewis, sandwiched around a road matchup against Incarnate Word. After making return trips to Midwestern State and West Texas A&M, the Hilltoppers will also face Eastern New Mexico, Northeastern State and Truman State. As it has in the last two seasons, the conference race could come down to the last match of the season in which St. Edward's will have a road match with long-time rival St. Mary's.

"Our first five matches will tell a lot about our team as we face five potential top-25 teams," Young says. "We will then know what we need to do to earn an NCAA bid in our next 14 matches. The 2009 schedule was built to give the team every opportunity to make the NCAA tournament."

FINAL THOUGHTS

With eight starters returning and the addition of several talented players, the Hilltoppers would like to finish the season stronger than last year and return to the NCAA tournament. St. Edward's last appeared in the postseason in 1999.

"We have 15 new players this season, so integrating them into the team and system of play is key," Young says. "The chemistry building will be made a little easier as the team plans on traveling to Jamaica in August for a preseason tour where we will get to play against a few professional teams and the U20 Jamaican National Team. The days spent on the trip should allow all of the players to get great game experience, but more importantly a chance to bond as a team."

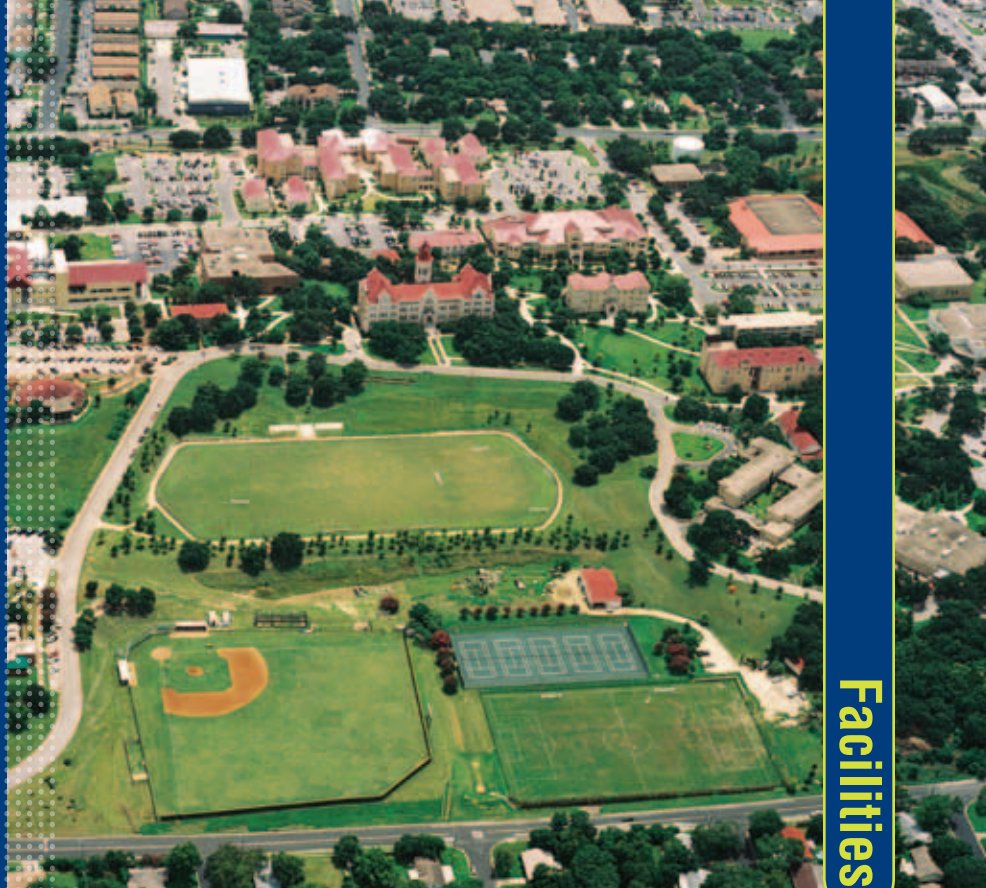

HEARTLAND CONFERENCE

Founded in 1999, the Heartland Conference is an NCAA Division II conference consisting of 10 schools from Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. These schools include founding members St. Edward's University, University of the Incarnate Word, St. Mary's University and Lincoln University, as well as expansion members Dallas Baptist University, Oklahoma Panhandle State University, UT–Permian Basin, Texas A&M–International, Newman University and University of Arkansas–Fort Smith.

The Heartland Conference is the newest of the NCAA Division II conferences. At the present time, there are 24 conferences in NCAA Division II, totaling almost 300 institutions in full or provisional status across the nation.

FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT

RECREATION AND CONVOCATION CENTER

Located in the heart of campus, the Recreation and Convocation Center is a full-featured modern facility equipped with a fitness center, a six-lane pool, four racquetball/handball courts, two full-size basketball floors and space to display all the Hilltopper trophies.

SOCCER FIELD

St. Edward's unveiled a new soccer field for men's and women's soccer in 2004, which sits just below Main Building looking out over the downtown Austin skyline. A half-mile walking/running track encircles the field.

ST. EDWARD'S UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS

St. Edward's University competes as a member of NCAA Division II in 11 sports, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball. After enjoying many successful seasons in the NAIA, St. Edward's Athletics made the move to Division II in 1999. As a charter member of the Heartland Conference, the Hilltoppers have won 30 conference championships in the past 10 years. In fact, 19 of those titles have happened since the beginning of the 2006–2007 academic year. Since joining the NCAA, a total of 40 Hilltoppers have earned All-America honors, and St. Edward's has sent 41 teams to the NCAA national tournament.

Hilltopper Athletics is coming off perhaps the most impressive three-year stint in program history. Twenty teams have advanced to the NCAA national tournament: the softball team finished tied for third in the nation in 2008; the men's golf lost in a sudden-death playoff to finish second in the nation in 2008; and the women's soccer team, along with the men's and women's tennis teams, made a deep run in the national tournament. The women's golf team qualified for the regional tournament three years in a row, and the baseball team won back-to-back Heartland Conference Championships in 2007 and 2008.

Hilltopper athletes have enjoyed unprecedented success in the classroom too, earning a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher for the past 13 semesters. This past spring, 146 student-athletes were named to the Heartland Conference All-Academic Team and 42 individuals earned a 4.0 GPA.
