# Meet the Coaches

## NICK COWELL

**Head Coach • University of Birmingham, England '83**



Nick Cowell begins his fourth year as head coach of the women's soccer team. Last season, Cowell guided the squad to a 13-3-1 record and narrowly missed making the NCAA National Tournament for the third-consecutive season. In 2007, he led the Hilltoppers to their second-consecutive Heartland Conference championship and second-straight NCAA National Tournament appearance. St. Edward's equaled its school record in wins with a 17-4 record. In 2006, the Hilltoppers finished with a 17-3-2 overall record. That was a 9 ½ game improvement from the 2005 season in which St. Edward's finished 6-11-2. For his efforts, Cowell was named Heartland Conference Coach of the Year and South Central Region Coach of the Year.

Since taking over at St. Edward's, Cowell has produced 18 all-conference players, 14 all-region players, two Heartland Conference Players of the Year and three All-America selections. His teams have compiled a 47-10-3 record, and more importantly, they tallied a team GPA of 3.54 last spring. Twenty-five of his players were named to the Heartland Conference Honor Roll last Spring and 10 of them earned 4.0 GPAs.

In his 20-year college coaching career, Cowell is 263-97-24. His 263 wins have been compiled at five different colleges: The College of Wooster (1989–1990), Trinity University (1991–1998), Baylor University (1999–2002), Sewanee (2003–2005) and St. Edward's (2006–present). Cowell has guided his teams to 10 conference championships and 10 NCAA National Tournament appearances. He coached 11 All-Americans and 13 Conference Players of Year while earning Conference Coach of the Year honors eight times.

He has served as the National Soccer Coaches Association of America National Rankings Committee chair, NSCAA All-American Committee regional chair and NCAA Selection Committee regional chair. He is involved in NSCAA national and regional clinics, and United States Soccer Federation regional and state clinics and coaches in the Olympic Development Program at national, regional and state levels.

Cowell received his bachelor's degree in French and Spanish at the University of Birmingham, England, in 1983 and earned his master's degree in Sports Psychology, and Curriculum and Instruction at Cleveland State University in 1988. He holds an USSF "A" license, a NSCAA Advanced National Diploma and an English F.A. Preliminary Coaching Badge.

## JAY MASON

**Assistant Coach • Third Season • Incarnate Word '04**



Jay Mason begins his third season as assistant coach for the Hilltopper women's soccer program. Mason provides the team with on-the-field training and is the goalkeeping coach. Mason previously served as the assistant coach for the Incarnate Word men's and women's soccer teams during the 2004 and 2005 seasons. He was an assistant coach for the women's team that went 22-12-5 during his two seasons with the squad and won the 2005 Heartland Conference title. On the men's side, Mason was the goalkeeping coach where he produced one All-Southwest Soccer Conference Goalkeeper and PDL draftee (Paul Tate, Laredo Heat). Mason served as the goalkeeping coach for the Classics Elite Soccer Club and the head

coach for St. Mary's Hall during the 2005 and 2006 seasons.

Mason graduated summa cum laude in 2004 from Incarnate Word with a BS in Physical Education. He earned an MS in Kinesiology from Incarnate Word in 2006.

## ANNA VILLARREAL

**Volunteer Assistant Coach • First Season • Baylor '07**



Anna Villarreal arrives on the hilltop after serving as a business analyst for Geokinetics Inc. in Houston.

Villarreal's playing experience includes one year at St. Louis University and three years at Baylor. In four seasons, she tallied 18 goals and 13 assists. During her sophomore season, she was named to the Big 12 Conference All-Newcomer Team. During her senior season, she was named Big 12 Player of the Week and helped lead the Bears to a berth in the Big 12 Tournament for the first time in four seasons. She also received Big 12 academic honors. Villarreal earned a BA in Sociology from Baylor in 2007.

# Season Preview

## HILLTOPPERS LOOKING FOR RETURN TRIP TO NCAA TOURNAMENT

The 2008 St. Edward's women's soccer team narrowly missed winning its third-consecutive Heartland Conference championship and advancing to the NCAA playoffs for the third-straight year. Head coach **Nick Cowell** and the Hilltoppers finished second in the conference just one half game behind conference champion Incarnate Word.

"Our record of 13-3-1 was not too dissimilar to previous years," Cowell said. "Our one blemish was an overtime loss at Incarnate Word. If we had won that match, we would have won conference and made the NCAA tournament. All three of our losses came to nationally-ranked teams. The margin between success and lack thereof is sometimes miniscule."

The Hilltoppers have a wealth of talent returning this season with nine starters and 18 letterwinners coming back from a team that produced a 13-3-1 overall record and a 10-1-1 record in the Heartland Conference.

"Our strength should be our experience and our leadership," Cowell said. "Our seniors are all starters who have invested a lot of time and energy in our program. They take ownership of everything to do with our team, both on and off the field. I am looking forward to seeing how we overcome each of our hurdles once the season begins."

The Hilltopper attacking front will welcome back senior **Stacey Copeland** who led the team with 11 goals last season. She also notched four game-winning goals on her way to being named first-team all-Heartland Conference and first-team all-region. Junior **Janae Averett** and sophomore **Kelly Servage** both return as well, after the duo scored a combined nine goals. Also vying for playing time will be juniors **Amanda DeLaFosse** and **Katy Sutton**, along with sophomores **Brianna Hinnenkamp** and **Tyra Ponce**, and freshman **Sara Singleton**.

"We are very deep at the forward position this season," Cowell said. "Stacey Copeland returns and is expected to add to her scoring ability this season. Servage and Hinnenkamp scored some big goals this spring and were the most improved players on the squad."

Gone from last year's team in the midfield is **Aimee Langlinais**, who took with her 78 career appearances for the Hilltoppers. St. Edward's returns two starting midfielders from last year's squad. Sophomore **Bethany Bennett** returns after leading the team with six assists and finishing up as an honorable mention All-America selection. Both senior **Korre Fairman** and sophomore **Jordan Ynostrosa** return after starting the majority of the matches from last season. Also joining the group will be junior **Emily Arnold**, who registered four goals in 2008. Senior **Kim Abbott** will move to the midfield after claiming a forward spot the last three seasons.

"Emily Arnold was the team's most improved player from the fall through the spring," Cowell said. "She has the foot skills, shooting range and soccer intelligence to dominate her position. At the outside midfield positions, Bethany Bennett has continued to impress after a fantastic freshman season and Kim Abbott will bring speed and athleticism. This group will be joined by transfer **Crystal Trevino**, and true freshmen **Lexi Iverson**, **Kelsey Hamann** and **Olivia Collado**."

The Hilltoppers return two of their three starting defenders from last year's team that only allowed 0.63 goals-against average and produced 10 shutouts. The one loss is a big one in All-American **Kelsey Yeatts**. Back this year, are senior **Alex Podowski** and junior **Kelly Boyd**. Podowski has started every match since she has arrived on the hilltop. Boyd will move from an outside defender and take over for Yeatts as the central defender. sophomore **Kelsey Long** will also challenge for playing time.

Moving to the back line this season will be senior **Korre Fairman** and junior **Janae Averett**. Junior **Kelli Thomas** and sophomore **Katie Jameson** will provide depth to the defensive backfield.

"The spring season was interesting because two of our three key defenders were brand new," Cowell said. "Korre Fairman and Janae Averett were converted to defender because of their great athleticism and speed. They did a tremendous job considering they were not used to playing there."

The defense will be strengthened by freshmen **Olivia Collado**, **Stephanie Lawrence** and **Tina Taylor**.

St. Edward's returns two quality goalkeepers from last season, junior **Troi Jorgensen** and sophomore **Claire Tilton**. The duo split time in goal the entire year and it produced great results. They combined for a 0.63 goals-against average and 10 shutouts.

"We are fortunate to have two quality keepers in Troi Jorgensen and Claire Tilton," Cowell said. "Troi is very consistent and has improved her kicking and communication over the spring. Claire has been working on her overall fitness and the psychological side of being a leader in the back."



## THE SCHEDULE

After winning the Heartland Conference in 2006 and sharing the title in 2007, the Hilltoppers narrowly missed a "three-peat." Incarnate Word, who took home the conference title in 2008, will again be the Hilltoppers' main conference competition, but the rest of the teams are slowly catching up as it looks to provide a tight conference race this year.

"The Heartland Conference is tough because of the intense rivalry we have with the other Catholic schools in Texas," Cowell said. "The conference has always been a fight between us and Incarnate Word, but the other teams are catching up fast."

St. Edward's will also take on four teams that qualified for the NCAA tournament. The Hilltoppers will have a very difficult three-match stretch where they go on the road to face Nebraska—Omaha, Truman State and West Texas A&M. Truman State won the South Central Regional and advanced all of the way to the "Elite Eight" round of the NCAA tournament.

"We have deliberately challenged the team with the hardest in-region schedule we could find," Cowell said. "We will need to find a way to win those early matches. We have also provided them with a tough road schedule. This will hold us in good stead for any road playoff match we have. We want to be consistent throughout the entire season."

## FINAL THOUGHTS

With nine of 11 starters returning from last season's squad more seasoned, the coaching staff believes it has a team that is more experienced and ready to return to post season play.

"This year's team will be very experienced compared to last year's," Cowell said. "We had a strong spring season, having played against and beaten good Division I and foreign competition. Our senior class is strong, and our sophomores will have benefitted from the increased playing time in the spring."

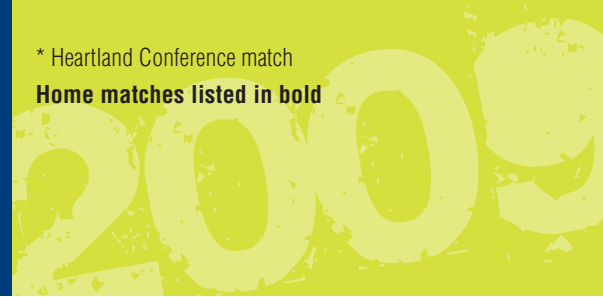

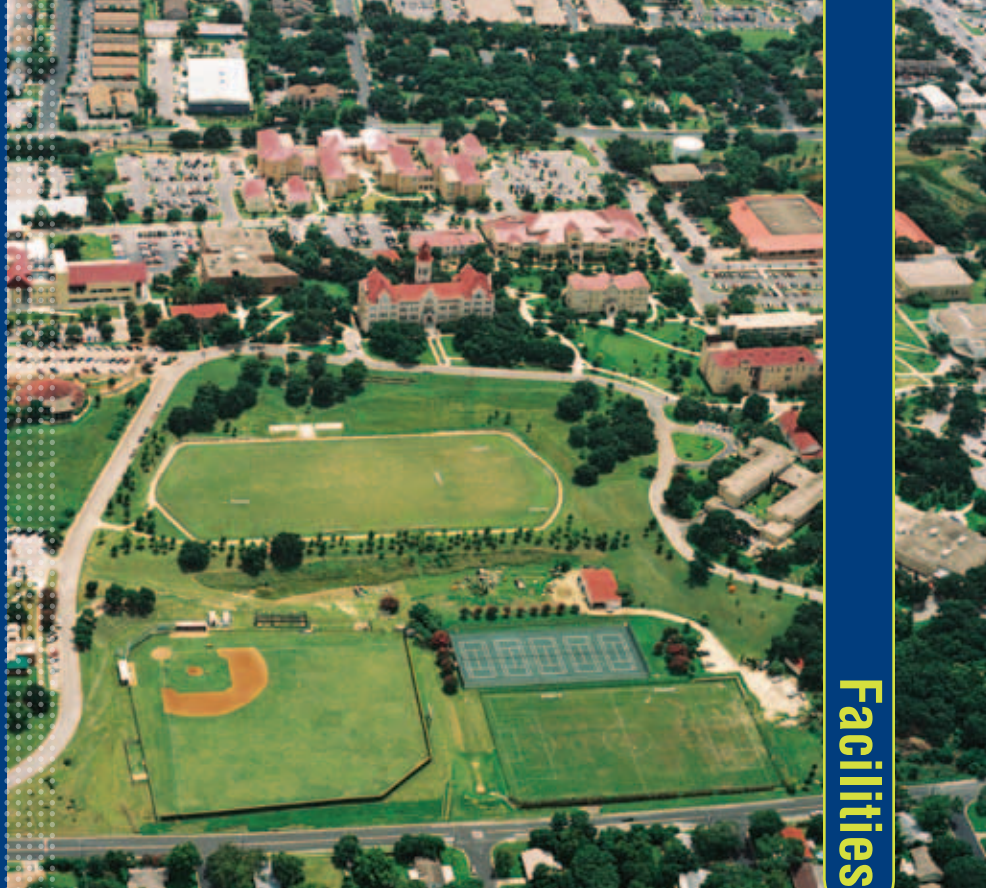

## HEARTLAND CONFERENCE

Founded in 1999, the Heartland Conference is an NCAA Division II conference consisting of 10 schools from Texas, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. These schools include founding members St. Edward's University, University of the Incarnate Word, St. Mary's University and Lincoln University, as well as expansion members Dallas Baptist University, Oklahoma Panhandle State University, UT–Permian Basin, Texas A&M–International, Newman University and University of Arkansas–Fort Smith.

The Heartland Conference is the newest of the NCAA Division II conferences. At the present time, there are 24 conferences in NCAA Division II, totaling almost 300 institutions in full or provisional status across the nation.

## FACILITIES AND EQUIPMENT

## RECREATION AND CONVOCATION CENTER

Located in the heart of campus, the Recreation and Convocation Center is a full-featured modern facility equipped with a fitness center, a six-lane pool, four racquetball/handball courts, two full-size basketball floors and space to display all the Hilltopper trophies.

## SOCCER FIELD

St. Edward's unveiled a new soccer field for men's and women's soccer in 2004, which sits just below Main Building looking out over the downtown Austin skyline. A half-mile walking/running track encircles the field.

## ST. EDWARD'S UNIVERSITY ATHLETICS

St. Edward's University competes as a member of NCAA Division II in 11 sports, including baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball. After enjoying many successful seasons in the NAIA, St. Edward's Athletics made the move to Division II in 1999. As a charter member of the Heartland Conference, the Hilltoppers have won 30 conference championships in the past 10 years. In fact, 19 of those titles have happened since the beginning of the 2006–2007 academic year. Since joining the NCAA, a total of 40 Hilltoppers have earned All-America honors, and St. Edward's has sent 41 teams to the NCAA national tournament.

Hilltopper Athletics is coming off perhaps the most impressive three-year stint in program history. Twenty teams have advanced to the NCAA national tournament: the softball team finished tied for third in the nation in 2008; men's golf lost in a sudden-death playoff to finish second in the nation in 2008; and the women's soccer team, along with the men's and women's tennis teams, made a deep run in the national tournament. The women's golf team qualified for the regional tournament three years in a row, and the baseball team won back-to-back Heartland Conference Championships in 2007 and 2008.

Hilltopper athletes have enjoyed unprecedented success in the classroom too, earning a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher for the past 13 semesters. This past spring, 146 student-athletes were named to the Heartland Conference All-Academic Team and 42 individuals earned a 4.0 GPA.
